Lenten Events at Northminster

Mauddy Thursday Seder Dinner

As an observant Jew, Jesus celebrated Passover – a meal and celebration remembering when God passed over the Israelites as he sent the plagues on the land of Egypt. It also celebrates the liberation of the Israelites from the bondages of slavery in Egypt. The Passover meal is called a Seder from the Hebrew word for order – because God orders all creation. As Christians we honor each other and God with a Passover meal. We do this for three reasons – because Jesus did it and our Passover links us to him and to the Jewish roots of our faith. Secondly, the meal also celebrates freedom and calls us to labor for the liberation of all enslaved people. Thirdly, the personal challenge of Passover – freeing ourselves from personal enslavements – benefits all of us.

Mauddy Thursday is the night that Jesus celebrated the Passover with his disciples, so we will gather Thursday, April 21 at 6 pm in Calvin Hall with a beef brisket meal and Passover Seder to follow. We will also celebrate communion. **Reservations are required by calling the church office (251-9489)** or emailing sglant@northminster-indy.org. The cost will be \$9.00 for adults, \$5.00 for children and a family maximum of \$30.00. Childcare will be provided for children

under 6 after the meal is eaten. Reservations are due by noon on Monday April 18th. If you want to skip dinner and just come for the Seder celebration and worship, please arrive by 6:30 pm. Pastoral pondering . . .

Easter is always such an awesome worship experience. The music, the brass, the sun, the flowers, the excitement and elation all go together to fill us with resurrection joy. And what a delight to sit up front and look out on a full sanctuary. But when it is time to preach the Easter Good News to this crowd of expectant faces I am never quite sure where to start.

For me, Easter comes at the end of the most emotional week of the church year. The ups and downs of Holy Week never fail to test my faith and tug at my emotions. By the time we reach Sunday I am ready for a resurrection. But I look at all those who missed Holy Week and I can't help but wonder what Easter means to them? If you go from the exciting parade of Palm Sunday directly to the resurrection (or as some will do - go from Christmas straight to Easter with nothing in-between) what meaning does the day hold?

So much of our church year is focused on the Good News, God's grace, forgiveness, the presence of the Holy in our lives and all the things we get out of our faith. Holy Week is the one time that focuses directly on what God gave up for us, what Jesus sacrificed, what our faith cost.

Holy Week observances call us to move behind the joyful celebrations of Palm Sunday and Easter, and focus on

the suffering, humiliation, and death that is part of Holy Week. It is important to place the hope of the Resurrection, the promise of newness and life, against the background of death and endings. It is only in walking through the shadows and darkness of Holy Week and Good Friday, only in realizing the horror and magnitude of the dying Jesus on the cross, only in contemplating the ending and despair that the disciples felt on Holy Saturday, that we can truly understand the light and hope of Sunday morning!

Holy Week is a time to experience the depths of our faith, not just the heights. I hope you will plan to worship with us on Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. See what a difference those services can make in your Easter celebrations.

Big day, big returns

A lot was laid out on the table March 27; the Offering of Letters, the *Sound and Spirit* concert with a free-will offering for Wheeler Mission and the One A-Maizing dinner for the Interfaith Hunger Initiative. It was a big and busy day, and some of our volunteers seemed to have just moved in. But by evening, the benefits were clear.

Over 350 people attended the Travelin' McCoury's bluegrass concert sponsored by *Sound & Spirit* the free-will offering for Wheeler Mission collected \$1500. Seventy-five people reserved places at the One A-Maizing dinner and we collected

over \$1200 for the Interfaith Hunger Initiative. We set up a letter-writing center for the Bread for the World's Offering of Letters that requested our senators support initiatives that streamline our government's global hunger programs.

How many people in Indianapolis and in Kenya are better this month than they were last month from your gifts of time and money? Eighteen dollars buys a Kenyan child a year of school, and \$50 buys 1000 lbs. of food for hungry Hoosiers.

In January, Wheeler Mission

supplied lodging for 14,000 people, served 32,000 meals, and provided 172 medical/dental services. Easter dinner at Wheeler Mission costs \$2.25. We collected \$1500 for Wheeler Mission.

We sent almost 50 letters to Washington, standing up to global hunger issues and asking our government to do the same.

You will be enriched in every way so that you can be generous on every occasion and through us your generosity will result in thanksgiving to God: Second Corinthians 9:11.

Dayspring & Wellspring - A Saturday Morning Mission

The fact is families are the fastest growing segment of the homeless population in Indiana today. In the last 25 years, the Dayspring Center has become a full-service agency, providing services to nearly 4,000 families including over 12,000 children. Dayspring is one of the recipients of Our Future is Now Capital Campaign funds as they begin renovations on their kitchen area.

Dayspring also operates Wellspring Cottage, a 2-year transitional program that houses 12 families each year in apartment-like dwellings. Here, families address many of the problems that may have contributed to their becoming homeless in the first place; addiction, lack of skills and education, large debt. Wellspring assists each family with finding employment, developing a budget and reducing debt, learning how to maintain a permanent home, and adult education. It also operates an active after-school program for children.

What and when:

On Saturday, April 30, 9:30 a.m.-noon, Northminster is helping Dayspring and Wellspring Cottage prepare the gardens for spring planting and spruce up the grounds. The mission is two-fold: a **family-friendly** two-hour mission opportunity, and a request that you each **invite a friend to help and then invite that friend to join you for church the next day.**

Where and how:

Dayspring Center is at 1537 North Central; Wellspring Cottage is located at 3736 North Meridian. Parking is available in back of both locations. The Northminster bus will shuttle volunteers to each location at 9a.m. that morning

or you can carpool from our parking lot. When you sign up, you may choose to work either place but be aware that we want two fairly even teams of volunteers. **Each group** will rally at their assigned location by 9:30 a.m. for coffee, donuts, instructions and prayer.

What:

We are putting out a call for small garden tillers, but everyone should bring the tool or tools you would like to work with; gloves, push brooms, rakes, spades, hoes, hedge clippers, those nifty contraptions that keep yard bags upright while you fill them, all the fun stuff.

How:

Find sign-up sheets on the mission board across from the chapel and watch for Mission Team members in the Gathering Place on Palm Sunday and Easter, too. For more information, contact Pastor Ruth Moore at ruthmoore@northminster-indy.org.

What else is happening? Youth artwork on display

Have you seen the artwork at the top of the stairs in the Gathering Place? This art project was completed by Northminster middle and high school youth in December 2010. The piece is called "Faith Heals" and was inspired by a photograph we looked at during Sunday School. The photo was of a field which was once a toxic waste site. Inside the field was a circle where people had planted specific types of plants that rejuvenated the soil and made the land fertile again. We took this imagery and made our "own" life fields. Inside the rectangles were all the negative things in our lives that can create a toxic environment – things like hate, depression, violence etc. Inside the circles were the positive things in our lives that "lift us up" and heal us from the toxins in our lives – God, family, hope and so on. Next we used these individual works to create our large Cross. The Red Cross is there for us to put our sins and negative toxins on. We then have faith that Jesus will take away our sins and give us a second chance. We will be "resurrected" from all the bad stuff. Inside the white circles the words represent the healing

Bridge Team: Walking across the Bridge

The distance between the beginning and end of a capital campaign is, for us, three years. For a period of months the pleas, parties and pledges are made and then we begin a longer period of time when we fulfill our promises. This is called the Bridge. Andy and Lisa Longo were the Bridge Team for our first campaign, *Open to the Future*, and we all enjoyed the monthly updates from Building Chair Bob Gudgel. We got financial updates so we could track our progress and measure the brick and mortar rising from an out of date, inefficient infrastructure.

There's a new Bridge Team in town. Mary Tarbell and Maureen Purcell have a new task for a new capital campaign, *Our Future is Now*. Over the next few years, we will continue to keep you informed about our contribution status and we will walk across this Bridge occasionally pausing to look at what we have.

As of mid March 2011, we have

received 198 *Our Future is Now* capital campaign pledges totaling \$1.2 million. One hundred sixty-two of those pledging have already begun making payments and Northminster has received \$288,702.

Remember there are envelopes in the pews and around the church where you can make a pledge payment. And for those of you who have not pledged to *Our Future is Now*, take a hint from our theme; You can start a pledge or contribute **Now** or at anytime. We hope you will remember the campaign when you want to honor a member of the congregation, an anniversary, special birthday or even a sermon.

We begin our walk across the Bridge in a place where we (Mary and Maureen) spend a lot of time. We are, among other things, volunteer receptionists. We very well remember working at a small desk in a dark paneled room and stuffing envelopes for the homebound at a desk slightly larger than those used by second graders. Our light source was

a lamp. We wanted to help with newsletter publishing, data entry, respond to Session's plan for a new website but there wasn't room for a computer on that desk.

Today, our volunteer duties take place at a modern work station with a computer, security screen, views of the Gathering Place and education wing, and an attractive seating area for guests.
