## Pastoral pondering . . .

**B**y the time this issue of *News & Views* reaches your home we will already have begun the season of Advent. This is the beginning of the church year. We start again in the sacred cycle that leads us through the waiting of Advent, the birth of Christmas, the revelation of Epiphany, the preparation of Lent, the suffering and death of Holy Week and the Resurrection of Easter. After Easter we will move through the reception of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost and then flow into the rhythm of Ordinary time.

Many of us did not grow up with this liturgical calendar. We celebrated Christmas and Easter, and

the other 50 weeks were just Sunday. I am glad the church has come back to celebrating the seasons.

The church seasons remind us of the seasons of our own lives and the seasons of a congregation's life. We know waiting. We understand new birth and we have also experienced suffering and death. The church seasons remind us once again of who we are as the people of God, what we can expect from God in each season, and where we will "end up" at the end of it all.

The most meaningful Advent I ever remember was 27 years ago when I was pregnant. The whole idea of waiting and preparing for birth took on new meaning that year. This year I am just beginning the wait for my first grandchild who is estimated to arrive in June (yes, I am too young for this and yes, you will get sick of hearing me talk about it). Maybe this will help me focus in some new ways.

This Advent I will be praying for each of you. I hope you find the light in the darkness, the warmth in the cold, and the hope in the bleakness as we wait together.

## 2009 Stewardship and Open to the Future Update

Both the 2009 Stewardship and the *Open to the Future* (OTTF) campaign receipts continue to be on track to successful completion. Through the second week in November, over \$700,000 in 2009 pledges have been received, 85 percent of the total pledged, and, with less than 2 years complete in the third year OTTF campaign, over \$2 million has been received, better than 75 percent of the total pledged.

## Last Chance for IRA Charitable Rollover

Set to expire Thursday, December 31, the exclusion from gross income of charitable contributions coming directly from IRAs for those over age 70½ has not been extended. Qualifying contributions to Northminster Church made by year

end are excluded from gross income for federal tax purposes and consequently from Indiana income tax. Contact Don Craft in the church office at 251-9489 for additional details.

# Christmas Joy Offering

**O**n Christmas Eve the Presbyterian Church takes up a very special collection with a long history. The Christmas Joy Offering began in 1930 in order to supplement inadequate retirement income and provide supplemental insurance for former ministers, missionaries, church workers and their families. Under the former PCUS, the fund was officially called the Joy Gift.

As the PCUS became the United Presbyterian Church in the United States (UPCUSA), an Advent offering, the White Gift, was collected for general mission and world relief. In 1964 its name was changed to Christmas Offering which provided support for health and welfare concerns related to children. This emphasis continued until 1973 when the offering was used, once again, to assist former servants of the church who were on inadequate pensions. In 1974 racial ethnic education was added, followed by, in 1979, nursing home care assistance. The Board of Pensions and racial ethnic education shared the funds equally.

In 1988 PCUS and the UPCUSA offerings were joined into one Christmas Offering Joy Gift. Quite a mouthful. In 1989 the offering became more simply Christmas Joy Offering and the General Assembly charged that the Board of Pensions and the Presbyterian racial ethnic schools and colleges would be equal recipients.

Today the Board of Pensions, through its Assistance Programs, recognizes the faithfulness of current and retired church workers

by providing funds to help them through difficult times. Income Supplements, Housing Supplements, Shared Grants and Emergency Assistance Grants are available to church workers who have financial need or an emergency. It is important that we sustain those who have sustained us.

The other half of our Christmas Joy Offering provides scholarships to deserving students as well as help with basic needs. The Presbyterian Church has long promoted education and established radical ethnic schools and colleges. Among them are Stillman College in Tuscaloosa, Alabama, Knoxville College in Tennessee, Cook Native American Ministries in Tempe, Arizona, and Barber-Scotia College in North Carolina. Our gifts allow these schools to continue ministries, to evolve in response to changing needs and circumstances, just like the Offering has evolved. For example, Cook School for Christian Leadership is considering strategies for taking educational ministry directly to Native American reservations.

Just as our name has changed, PCUS or UPCUSA or PCUSA, the Christmas Joy Offering has taken a number of paths to the work it does today. Its strongest focus has always been on the needs of church servants in times of crisis. As the country changed, the focus grew to include racial ethnic education in order to assist in developing leaders in the church and in society.

On Christmas Eve, remember our past and our future, our retired ministers and our students.



## Interfaith Hospitality Network

### We have room!

Over 12 years ago, a Northminster committee called Social Education wrote a proposal about joining the Interfaith Hospitality Network (IHN), then a young organization which called on churches to house temporarily homeless families between 5 p.m. and 7 a.m. Lynne Tobin was one who presented the idea to the Session and the Session approved it immediately.

IHN Directors were surprised that Presbyterians were able to present and pass such a motion in one meeting without forming a committee first. The proposal had answered questions before they were asked and had already identified the spaces and supplies that would be needed. Thanks to Lynne Tobin and other Deacons, IHN has been a staple in Northminster's Mission efforts for many years. Because of our construction and IHN's restructuring, we halted the hosting of families in late 2007.

But get ready. IHN returns to Northminster in February. We are back on their schedule and they are back on ours. Soon the Mission Team will begin reevaluating new spaces and taking inventory on supplies. Watch for signs and sign-ups. IHN is back!

## Mission: Green Group

## Church School in December

On November 29, the first Sunday in Advent, the children of the Church School considered Luke 21: 25-36. It is Jesus' final week in Jerusalem.

God's steadfast love invites us to enter Advent by trusting and living out the realm Jesus proclaims. What signs of hope does Jesus have the disciples consider? How can we be signs of God's presence and promise to others?

## Chancel Choir and orchestra will offer C.P. E. Bach's *Magnificat* December 13

On Sunday morning December 13, the Northminster Chancel Choir, soloists, and orchestra will offer Carl Philipp Emanuel Bach's *Magnificat* at the 9 and 11 a.m. services.

C.P.E. Bach (1714–1788) was the second of five sons of Johann Sebastian Bach and his first wife, Maria Barbara Bach. He was a crucial composer in the transition between the Baroque and Classical periods and one of the founders of the Classical style. Unlike his father, who was relatively unknown during his lifetime, C.P.E. Bach was revered as a keyboardist and composer while he lived, and his influence was great during the mid 18th century and beyond. Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart (1756–1791) said of him, “He is the father, we are the children.”

One of the most beautiful stories in the New Testament is told in the first two chapters of the Gospel according to Luke—Christ's nativity



and childhood. Luke's gift for words shines forth from these pages in a series of passages that read like poetry and have become the very essence of belief to many Christians. Of particular beauty is the passage identified in the King James version of the Bible as “Mary's song of thanksgiving” (Luke 1:46–55), which begins, “My soul doth magnify the Lord,” or in Latin, “Magnificat anima mea Dominum.”

In Carl Philipp Emanuel Bach's hands, the *Magnificat* (1749) contains nine movements and is scored for

three trumpets, two horns, two flutes, two oboes, strings, and timpani. Joining John Wright, Director of Music, Marko Petricic, Music Associate, and our Northminster Chancel Choir are soloists Angelique Zuluaga, soprano; Ursula Kuhar, alto; Tim Grino, tenor, and Wayne Hu, bass. Thomas Gerber, founding member of

Indianapolis's Ensemble Voltaire, will play harpsichord; and Zach de Pue, concertmaster of the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra, will serve as concertmaster.

The Chancel Choir has enjoyed the challenge of learning this bright and joyous music. The final movement is a 246 measure fugue requiring athletic, nonstop singing for almost 8 minutes. We look forward to both praising God and sharing this majestic music with worshipers on December 13.
