## Construction Dedication November 22

Six months ago Teri Thomas selected our dedication date to be the Sunday before Thanksgiving. This surprised me at the time because we were looking at an early September construction completion date. I asked if she really wanted to wait ten weeks to do the dedication. She thought Thanksgiving was the perfect time to give thanks and ask blessings for our new building, no matter when it might be finished. We would certainly start using the building as soon as it was completed.

Fast forward a few months and here we are approaching November and construction is still in high gear. At a meeting on October 8 with our architect and general contractor, I was told that the anticipated completion date for our project was now November 19 (Teri must have prophetic powers).

I have been patient but perplexed by all the time extensions needed to get this project finished. I asked the question, "Why so long?" On a scale

of one to ten with ten being the most difficult, how hard has this project been? The immediate response of the architect and general contractor was a "nine." Tying-in the roof of the Gathering Place to seven different elevations of existing roofs became a monumental task. It was difficult enough to create the structure on paper, but proved to be even more difficult to build. Columns and structural beams of the old building were often not located exactly where

expected, necessitating redesigning and shifting of the new structure to best align with the old.

Though this has been difficult and time consuming, we are being rewarded with a unique structure that blends well with our past and sets the stage for our future mission. The workmen have told me

how much they like being a part of a difficult project which tests their skills. They have built numerous "box" churches—you know the ones that look like warehouses—but here they get to share in something of lasting beauty. Your Building Committee hopes you are pleased with the final product . . . even if some of the finishing touches extend beyond the 22nd.

# A Time to Trust

**N**orthminster has been a part of my life since I was little. My parents moved here from the East Coast when I was two and started attending Northminster shortly thereafter. I grew up here attending Sunday school, was confirmed here and attended youth group when Don Durrett was the youth pastor. After completing college at Hanover, I moved away from Indianapolis and Northminster for the next eight years and I have to admit I only sporadically attended church.

I returned to Indianapolis at the age of 30. I knew that I wanted to become active in a church again and wanted a church that would be inclusive of me as a single woman, that would welcome my ideas and involvement. But I was unsure if I should return to Northminster where I grew up or find a new church home. How would I decide what was the best plan for me?

I found this quote in my *Women's Devotional Bible* by Debra Klingsporn, a writer who wrote about the faith journey of one of the Columbine victims: "Our job is to be willing to let God be God and to trust him with the results." I had to try and let God lead me on the right path where I could comfortably and actively live my faith.

Yes, I will admit that it felt safe to rejoin Northminster, I was familiar with the services, the routine and knew many of the members here. I did find that I was sometimes identified as Jean and Bill's daughter and they were still active members of the church at that time. Although I was and still am proud to be remembered as their daughter, I feel that I have been able

to develop my own niche as a single woman with energy and ideas to share here. Even though I can't identify a specific moment when I knew that this is where I am supposed to be, I can look back and say: "Yes, God, you have landed me in the right place."

I have found that I have been able to be as active and involved as I want to be in this church. Although I haven't married and had a family in the traditional sense of "family," and it may sound corny, this church is my family. I have seen family in the support my sister and I received when my dad died in 1990 and my mom in 2000, both suddenly. I see family in my ChristCare group when members will remember a prayer concern I had and follow up with me on it. I see family in the six years that I have been going on the Mexico mission trip with youth and adults working side by side and helping each other and making sure everyone is getting breaks in the 90 degree heat. I see family every time we host Interfaith Hospitality Network and Becca Haag and I ask for your help making homeless families part of our family for the week they are here.

I remember from my family therapy class in social work school that families are a system of related people that all have an impact on the entire system. Family members all need to contribute to the system to make it work and everyone has a role to help make that family run smoothly. This contribution can be time and talents as well as financial. Northminster is a family that needs these contributions from all of us. We



are not related by blood but have the love of God and Jesus Christ in common.

I have been blessed that I can contribute my time and talents as well as have the financial means to support the ministries of Northminster. I have trusted in God that he will take care of me and provide what I need and so far, he has provided abundantly so I can give back to this family here at Northminster.

As I have gotten older I sometimes worry about what the future will bring being a single woman but God has provided so far and I trust he will do so in the future. I want to end with telling you about a statement that was made to me that I have never forgotten. I was recovering in the hospital from a routine surgery but required a few days in the hospital. Ruth Moore came to visit me and as we were talking, she said, "You know, Nancy, everyone at Northminster loves you and cares about you."

In the busyness of Deacon's meetings, choir rehearsal, youth group and other activities, I sometimes forget that Northminster is this family that is here to care about and support me and all of us. I trust, as I'm sure we all do, that God will keep the Northminster family together for many years to come and all of us play an important part in keeping this family together.

- Second, commit to pray regularly for the people on your list.

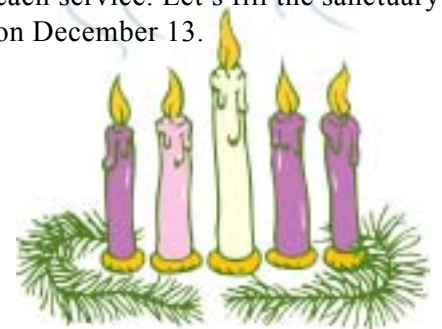
- Third, invite a friend, neighbor, relative, or colleague to worship at Northminster on Sunday, December 13.

## Mission and outreach

### Northminster is FIVE for FIVE

FIVE for FIVE is a winning stat for Northminster and the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). During a year's time, we tell you about the various offerings our denomination requests and you are familiar with their names.

*One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS)* is collected during Lent, especially on Palm Sunday or Easter. This offering helps people affected by natural and human-made disasters to rebuild their lives and communities. Presbyterians from all over the country have gone to the Gulf Coast to stand with those who lost their homes, their livelihoods, and members of their families. In addition, the offering continues to help communities confront the slower crises of hunger, disease, unemployment, and environmental degradation that make them vulnerable even before disasters strike. *OGHS* goes to Presbyterian Disaster Assistance

and Presbyterian Hunger Program and Self Development.

Seven Sundays after Easter is the *Pentecost Offering*. This one allows Northminster to keep 40 percent of what we receive to benefit children at risk. The remaining 60 percent supports mission through child advocacy, youth ministry, and young adult volunteer opportunities.

World Communion Sunday, on the first Sunday in October, is when we collect the *Peacemaking Offering*. This one helps bring International Peacemakers from our partner churches to share about ministries in their countries that seek justice and peace. Presbyterians all over the country honor this gift by directing funds to combat HIV/AIDS, to address the plight of child soldiers or to build Habitat for Humanity homes all over the world. This year, our portion went

to the Interfaith Hunger Initiative in Indianapolis.

Coming up Christmas Eve is the *Christmas Joy Offering* that supports the unmet needs of families who have been called to the mission of the Presbyterian Church. Some of those needs emerge during their service, others after their retirement. These gifts also help studies at racial ethnic schools and colleges to develop their gifts and find their own calling.

These four offerings support programs through PCUSA. But we have accepted a fifth opportunity. Our willingness to donate almost half of our Mission budget to support our own presbytery, our synod and the General Assembly gives us the special FIVE for FIVE designation. This basic mission support strengthens congregations, supports mission service personnel, and provides leadership training and scholarships a little closer to home. This additional support of Presbyterian programs benefits our friends in Quintana Roo, Mexico, Pyoca camp in Indiana, and Hispanic Ministries in Indianapolis. And that, friends, is a "high five."

# Education for all ages

## Church School in November

As November begins, the Church School will move from the story of Bartimaeus, who left his former life to follow Jesus, to the story of Naomi and Ruth (Ruth 1:1-18), who also leave behind familiar places and family. Their journey brings discovery that God goes with them, wherever they go. What and who do you long to have with you, wherever you go?

On November 8, the scripture lesson Ruth 3:1-5; 4:13-17 continues Naomi and Ruth's story. A struggle to survive becomes the means by which God restores hope to these women and to Israel. We will consider how we might seek restoration for those who need nourishment and encouragement.

November 15 brings another story of a woman whose future looks bleak. We will hear Hannah's story in 1 Samuel 1:4-20; 2:1-10. Hannah cries out to God, then names her longed-for child Samuel ("heard of God"). God's people rejoice that God acts for the sake of new beginnings. What should we hold onto and let go of in order to entrust ourselves to God?

On November 22, Christ the King Sunday, Children's Church will look at the trial of Jesus before Pilate in John 18:33-37. "Are you King of the Jews?" We will recall what we have learned from Jesus and others who teach us about God's way of love. The children of the Church School will join the congregation in celebration of the dedication of our new building at 10 a.m.

The first Sunday in Advent comes on November 29. The children will consider Luke 21:25-36. Jesus is talking with the disciples about how they will know when God plans amazing new things. What could we do this Advent to be signs of God's presence and promise to others?
